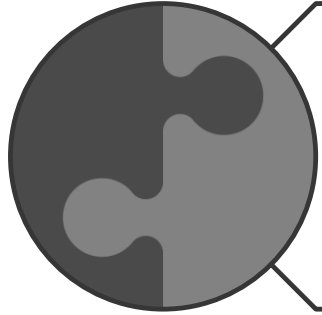

# CHAMPS DATA USE PREPAREDNESS NPHI'S AND MOH'S

- Mortality Review Workshops
  - Discuss under 5 deaths from CHAMPS data (Kenya)
  - Derive public health action strategies/policies to lower child mortality rates
- Data to Action Stakeholder Analysis
  - Identify organizations working on child survival initiatives (Kenya)
    - Educate on mission, presence, outcomes of CHAMPS
    - Establish collaborations
- Building NPHI capacities to work with CHAMPS data
  - Build capacity to analyze and use data at national sub-national level
  - IEDCR-Analyze and report on already available surveillance data on child morbidity/mortality
    - Use analyses to develop strategies and to develop case for action/political will

# Leveraging Partnerships to Catalyze Data to Action at the Country Level



In Bangladesh, partnerships with Vital Strategies and CDC support data to policy **training**, preparing IEDCR to use child mortality data to inform **policy development**



Building a health data observatory in Ethiopia via infrastructure capacity building and peer-to-peer **twinning** with Mozambique to share experience and expertise



Partnership mapping in Kisumu County, Kenya to connect stakeholders for more efficient **resource allocation and collaboration** on child health priorities
