


Electives in U.S. By Geography

Commonly Cited Challenges by Hosts in Global North



Challenges/Barriers	Solutions/Ideas
Student Funding	MOUs, alumni fund-raising, development offices, grants, differentiated tuition
Language Barriers	Skype interviews, peer med students
Visa Issuance	Standard letter for U.S. hosts to use/ share experiences and resources
Malpractice insurance	Firms provide short-term insurance meeting host requirements.
Lack of clinical spaces	Offer research, health disparities, community-based opportunities



Challenges	Solutions
Safety	International students and families follow US/European travel warnings-gun violence concern
Impact to Host	Internationalization; purposeful engagement of visiting students with host students
Relevance to Home (Sending Institution)	Taking back practices focused on patient safety; renewed confidence in Home institution's training, especially in diagnostic skills.
Professionalism across cultures	Host to communicate expectations (arrival time, dress, communication, etc) Student to Student wisdom.
Expectations of visiting students	Clear descriptions of elective, interaction between home and host institutions, pre-departure training, peer to peer guidance




